Follow-Up Stories

- Stories written to add details, reactions, different angles or later information to story that's already been reported
 - Stories evolve need to add new developments
 - More information available on second day, third day, etc.
 - More aspects, angles may emerge after first story published
 - Have time to gather more info, talk to more people, etc.
- Depend on previous story for all or some of their news value
 - Continuing events require understanding of first one
 - Importance of event or fact not always immediately known
 - First story might trigger reactions that become bigger stories
- Distinguish from breaking stories
 - Breaking stories still happening as they're reported
 - Follow-ups can run days, weeks, months after first story
 - Can involve later stand-alone events or ripple effects

Reasons for Follow-Up Stories

Continuity

- Set original story into current and long-term context
- Explain cause and effect where appropriate
- Explain possible consequences, who might be affected

Satisfy Curiosity

- Few issues, events fully explained in one original story
- Answer audience questions about topic
- Fill in details that emerge over time with more reporting

Add Balance

- First story frequently omits deeper details to make deadline
- Provide reactions of those interested and affected
- If there is opposition, provide those arguments

Cover Missed Stories

- Respond to story reported by competitor
- Must include & cite info from that story
- Provide fresh angles, interviews, points of view

When Running Follow-Up Stories:

You should not:

- Assume audience already knows about the original story
- Rehash more than a paragraph or two
- Take the same approach of a competitor who beat you to the original story
- Jump to unwarranted conclusions

You should:

- Treat them as separate stand-alone stories
- Include at least one paragraph of background info for context
- Try to get quotes from sources beyond those in first story
- Make notes for additional follow-ups
- Keep track of dates for later use (anniversaries, etc.)
- Keep track of elements that might lead to different stories
