Last time – Basic Concepts:

Stereotypes

- Applying exaggerated negative traits to everyone within a group, based on lack of experience

Homogeneity

- People or social groups that are similar in upbringing, culture or ethnic background

Navel Gazing

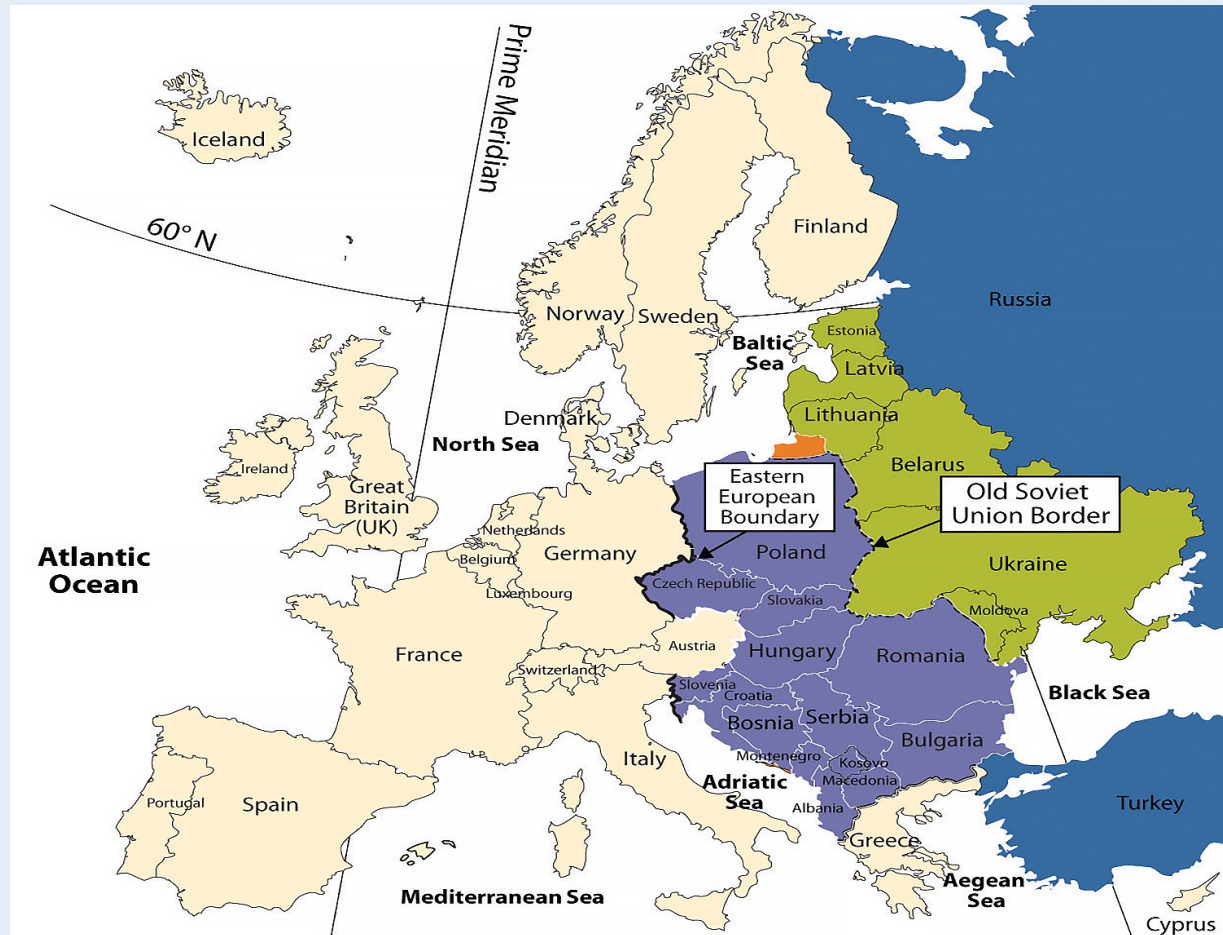
- Assuming your location, culture or experiences are the center of the universe

Otherness

- Different in appearance or character from what is familiar, expected, or generally accepted

- Less known, scary
- Foreign/cold
- Bond villains

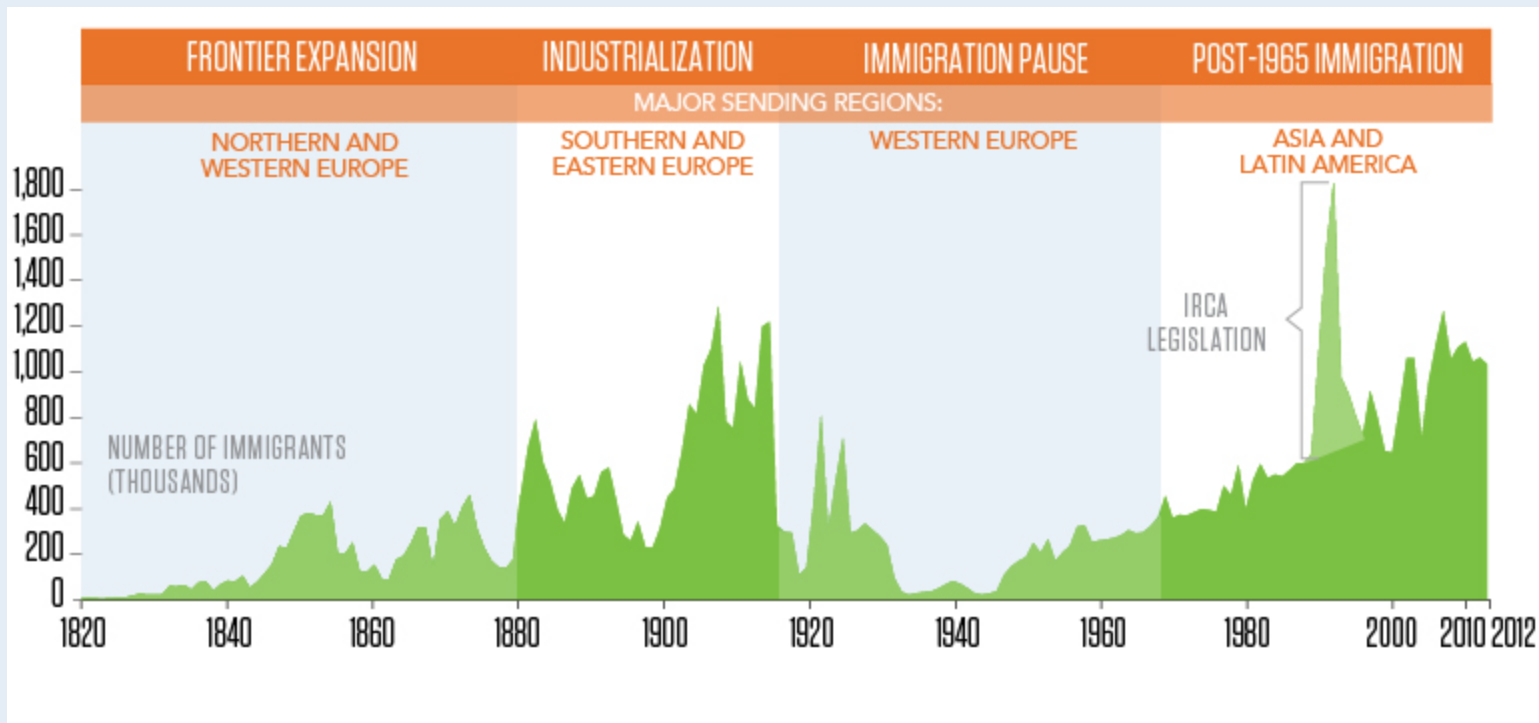

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Dominant recent narrative: Immigration



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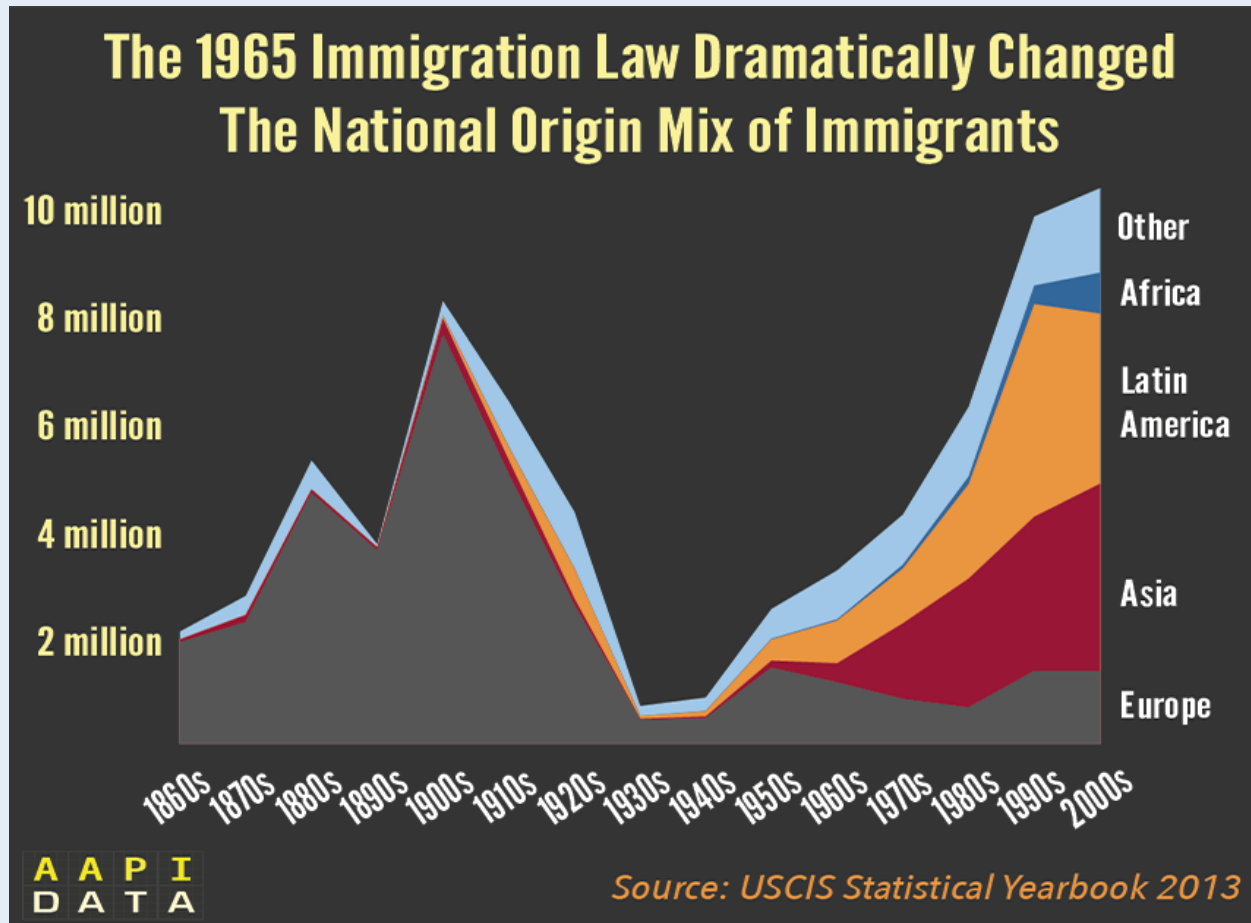
Key legislation:

Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965

- Abolished quota system based on national origin
- Prioritized skilled, talented, well educated people
- Aimed to reunite families with relatives in U.S.
- Favored workers with skills in short supply in U.S.
- Established new guidelines for refugees

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Changing Immigration Patterns



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Asia, by region



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Asia is divided into five geographical regions:

East Asia:

- China, Mongolia, North Korea, South Korea, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Macau

Southeast Asia:

- Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, East Timor, Vietnam

Central Asia:

- Tajikistan, Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan, Kyrgyzstan

South Asia:

- Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, India, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Bhutan, Nepal, Maldives

Western Asia:

- Georgia, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Cyprus, Syria, Lebanon, Palestine, Jordan, Iraq, Iran, Kuwait, Bahrain, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates

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Changing U.S. perceptions of East Asians

Before 1960s-70s:

- Ethnically undesirable others
- Full of filth and disease
- Marginal members of the human race
- Illiterate, undesirable, and unassimilable
- Denied the right to naturalize, intermarry
- Residentially segregated
- The enemy, forced into internment camps (WWII)

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Changing U.S. perceptions of East Asians

Last 50 years:

- Plucky, 'credit to their race'
- Provider of electronics, cars
- Assimilating into culture
- Masters of high tech
- Model Minority

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Model Minority Myth:

- Asian-Americans are better than other minorities
- Born successes, particularly in tech fields
- Quiet, hardworking, industrious
- Universal achievers through some combination of:
 - Innate abilities
 - Crazy work ethic
 - Relentless family pressure
 - Immigrant striving
 - Willingness to adapt
 - Not trying to lead

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Model Minority Myth problems:

- Patronizing, condescending tone
- Assumes all Asians are the same
- Assumes other ethnicities are inferior
- Creates unrealistic expectations within culture
- Creates tensions across cultures
- Assumes Asians shielded against racism
- Puts people from 48 countries into one box
- In its own way, reinforces otherness
- Seems to only apply to East Asians
- 'There is no nice racism'
